Applications must be for projects related to the study of national security in a global context. The deadline is January 31.

<u>Humanities Merit Scholarships</u> recognize academic achievements of undergraduate humanities majors'. Students may apply for funding from four endowments via one online application. The application deadline is February 11.

<u>Diversity and Identity Studies Collective (DISCO) Interdisciplinary Minors Scholarships</u> provide funding to undergraduate students with a minor in: American Indian Studies, Asian American Studies, Disability Studies, Latino/a Studies, and/or Sexuality Studies. Application deadline is February 18.

<u>Humanities Study Abroad Scholarships</u> provide funding support to undergraduates majoring in the humanities and planning to study abroad Summer 2011 – Spring 2012. Students may apply for funding from six endowments via one online application. Application deadline is February 25.

<u>The Student Technology Consultant Program</u> in the Center for the Study and Teaching of Writing, provides undergraduates with training to assist faculty, staff, and graduate students with individualized technology support.
