How declassi ed historic satellite images could help clear unexploded bombs in Vietnam 50 years later

Erin Lin, an associate professor in the Department of Political Science, was recently quoted in an article by PR discussing unexploded bombs in Vietnam and how to detect them. "When a lot of these cluster bombs and the general purpose bombs actually hit some of these really fertile areas of ambodia, they were essentially the areas that are the least likely for these bombs to go off," Lin said. "So you have farmers that are essentially in the most fertile areas who were the most afraid to farm because these are the most dangerous areas."

Dana Haynie selected as 2025 ASC Fellow by the American Society of Criminology

Dana Haynie, Arts and Sciences Distinguished Professor in the Department of Sociology, was recently selected as a 2025 AS Fellow by the American Society of riminology. This award honors scholarly contributions to criminology and distinction in the discipline and was given based on research excellence, service, leadership, and mentorship that characterize the candidate's professional record. The AS Award ommittee noted that Dr. Haynie's work has significantly advanced research on the processes related to crime and delinquency through the application of criminological and social network theories and methods.



Richard Petty elected to National Academy of Sciences

Richard Petty, a professor in the Department of Psychology, is among 120 members and 30 international members recently elected to the National Academy of Sciences (NAS). The NAS is committed to furthering science in America and its members are active contributors to the international scientific community. Members are elected in recognition of their distinguished and continuing achievements in original research and membership is considered one of the highest honors that a scientist can receive.



Nahar receives William Fowler Award

Sultana Nahar, a research professor in the Department of Astronomy, has received the prestigious William Fowler Award for Distinguished Research in Physics from the American Physical Society. Nahar's research focuses on the fundamental physics and astrophysics of energy propagation through stellar interiors defined as the opacity. The award is named in honor of Ohio State alumnus William Fowler who won the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1983 for his work on stellar nucleosynthesis.





Researching white women in the slave trade led to unique opportunity for economics undergraduate

Undergraduate research in higher education institutions isn't rare. However, an undergraduate student being listed as a first author on a paper cited in *The ew York Times* is significantly less common. That is exactly what happened to Benton Wishart, who graduated with an economics degree from The Ohio State University in May 2024. Wishart is listed as the first author of the paper, "Her Property Transactions: White Women and the Frequency of Female Ownership in the Antebellum Era," which went on to be discussed by *The ew York Times* and *The Economist*.

An associate professor in the School of ommunication,

Jingbo Meng has co-authored a paper titled, "Examining the ontent and Form of Supportive onversations with hatbots," recently accepted for publication in the International Journal of Human-Computer Interaction.

Her research revealed that people were more open to discussing their problems in detail when talking to humans rather than chatbots.
