Welcoming new college leaders



Piazza named senior director of Arts and Sciences marketing and communications

Carstens appointed chair of Department of Evolution, Ecology and Organismal Biology

Bryan Carstens, professor in the Department of Evolution, Ecology and Organismal Biology, has been <u>appointed chair</u> of the department for a four-year term, effective July 1, 2022. Carstens, who has been with Ohio State since 2012 and was vice chair of administration and research for the department from 2017-2021, is an expert in species delimitation and systematic biology.
